

Please encourage good study habits at home, as students will be set pre-learning tasks and homework for every subject. Details of work will be set on each Google Classroom area.






Chromebooks are available for sixth form use. They can be booked out each hour with Mrs Lopes/ Miss Alonso



Choosing the right University



Choosing the right place for you

- UCAS
- **Style** from traditional, with a focus on subject-based courses and research, to modern universities/colleges, with a greater focus on vocational courses.
- Location some are in large cities, others in small towns, by the coast or in the countryside it's all a major influence on the environment and lifestyle.
- Size larger universities can have more than 20,000 students, whereas some of the smallest have only a few thousand.
- **Culture and facilities** influenced by a range of factors, including the diversity of students who attend.
- What graduates do all universities collect destination statistics; it can be useful to find out what jobs or further study students go on to.
- **Tuition fees** can vary between universities and colleges; check if there are scholarships or bursaries available.
- Living costs accommodation, transport, and food can vary enormously.

Choosing the right course for you

- What does the course cover?
- Courses with the same title may be very different.
- Look carefully at the core course content, and the range of optional studies/modules available.
- Which modules are the most interesting and relevant to your career aspirations?
- See if the course or university/college offers any internship, placement, or study abroad opportunities.

- How is the course taught structured teaching, or more independent research? How many lectures are there, and how much group work will be done in seminars?
- How is the course assessed?



Visit the uni and the surrounding city - not just open days Look at youtube videos of faculties within the uni, many are created by students Talk to students at the universities and engage in what they do - Twitter is great for this. Admissions - contact the offices of where you want to go

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UCAS Personal statements/ references

- Complete your Personal Statement final draft by September 30th on Unifrog, so that your tutors can read it and support you. (4,000 characters or 47 lines maximum).
- Teachers have now written a subject reference and tutors are now using these alongside what they know about you from your self reference form or reading your personal statement, to write your overall reference.
- Final UCAS teacher predicted grades issued at the end of October.
- Progress checks issued 3rd November 2023



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UCAS Personal statements/ references

- Once complete, the student pays for their application.
- They then makes an appointment with one of the sixth form team who check through each application individually, ensuring that all information is correct.
- We read the students their teacher reference each reference is glowing with the positive attributes of each student.
- Predicted grades are entered and the application is then sent to UCAS.



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UCAS Grades

- These are a <u>holistic</u> reflection of how the student has been working, based on all available data including in class assessments, formal exams and work done in class.
- They reflect the best grade teachers feel the student is capable of achieving on a good day and err on the side of positivity.
- We need to be realistic as a school students will want to get onto the right courses, but we can only do that with realistic predicted grades.
- Progress reports also give a 'Current Grade' which is based on grades the student has actually achieved across the course and in recent assessments.




- If a student is doing their best, they just need to work smarter (*not more*).
 Change revision strategies, study environments etc.
- It is common for grades to start **lower and build over time.** They will continue to build over time as more content is delivered in Year 13.
- Use your judgment, a pattern of poor grades and low effort grades needs following up, and we are happy to talk through any concerns.
- Always contact the school we won't always have the right answers but we will try to find the most effective steps forward



- Help to reduce distractions i.e. TV, games consoles and mobile phones.
- Use common distractions as an incentive or treat when the work is done.
- Encourage students to share work schedules so you can work together.
- Side by side conversations can often work better than face to face: consider going for a walk or even on a car journey together.
- And remember, it is your house after all so don't be afraid to lay down the law. Your house rules apply!
- Be a cheerleader support, positivity and celebration for even the smallest of achievements.
