- Time management is on you, most work is independent learning
- Less subjects does not mean less work!
- Keeping up with extracurricular activities is a little more challenging
- Your social circle may change, but you will always be supported
- More leadership opportunities (great for personal growth)
- You are a young adult now and will be treated as such

Time management

- It is important to manage your time effectively and stay on top of your increased workload.
- If you fall behind and don't complete the work, you will struggle to understand the content in your next lesson, so keep up with it
- From experience, I feel that this is especially important if you want to take lots of content heavy subjects
- It will allow you to achieve great grades and have lots of free time outside of your studies

Tips:

- Don't leave things till last minute
- Ask for help if you need it
- Keep a timetable and/or a planner
- Keep your folders organised and up to date
- Establish a routine that works for you and stick to it
- Set realistic and achievable goals for yourself
- Prioritize tasks
- Eliminate distractions when carrying out a task
- Don't forget to also give yourself a break as they are equally as important

- Personal Statement
- Crucial for essay based Subjects

- Start reading now
- Make sure you read around the subjects you're interested in!

- PE 'Physiology of Sport and Exercise'

Workload

- Sixth Form is different. Your specialising in the subjects you enjoy, and looking at them at a greater level of complexity. Therefore as you would expect; your workload will increase
- Don't let this be daunting however, you guys have just finished your GCSEs so I am sure by now you're used to what revision is like. Work and revision will not be given to you in overwhelming quantities, however it will be small and consistent; with the likelihood you will have at least one small task to carry out every night.
- My personal advice to you guys is get on top early, I know you've just finished exams and probably want a relaxing start to the year but i cannot stress enough the importance of setting a routine or a study schedule. This will put you at a massive advantage not only for any Year 12 Exams you may have but also your A Levels in Year 13
- PLEASE do not work non stop; or do all night study sessions in your first week of year 12 (even if the work is due the next day) set manageable and realistic goals, and find a way to manage your time that works for you.

- Do course work in rooms with certain facilities such as product design and photography
