






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## Our Key Stage 5 Curriculum AQA<sup>2</sup>

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#### **Quotes from our students**

"Psychology is quite mathematical AND essay-based. Yes I would say you would need to be quite good at maths to undertake it. There is a lot to memorise and it is naturally analytical as such"

"You will have to pick apart case studies, experiments and surveys to discover biases, problems and inconsistencies. Psychology will encourage you to hypothesise, be self-critical and to deconstruct even the most convincing studies, so you need to be a good evaluator I would say, and be able to put forward a debate based on sound evidence"

"A fair amount of writing and a number of essays at A2 level. So if articulating yourself and writing long pieces isn't your forte then perhaps talk to a teacher to figure out whether you'll be able to pick it up."

"You might have been expecting to just explore the brain and how different factors influence human behaviour, and find yourself converting data and calculating percentages for observational studies"

What is Psychology? Psychology is the scientific study of the mind and behaviour, according to the British Psychological Society. Psychology is a multifaceted discipline and includes many sub-fields of study such areas as human development, sports, health, clinical, social behavior and cognitive processes. We formulate hypothesis and make predictions based on statistical analysis.
