

Headteacher's Update

The events of the past two weeks in the middle east have shocked us all and it appears that we are at the beginning of yet another humanitarian disaster. On Wednesday of this week, the Education Secretary, Gillian Keegan along with the Minister for Schools, Nick Gibb finally provided schools with advice and guidance about how to address the issue of the Israel-Hamas conflict.

The letter recognises the difficult position that schools are in given the fact that all school staff are provided with clear guidance from the department for education (DfE) about how to handle political situations and the importance of political impartiality when discussing sensitive political issues with students and their families. However, what is clear is that we should all be condemning acts of violence and terrorism and that we should not allow the escalating situation in the middle east to be an excuse for hateful views and behaviours within our schools and wider communities. As the letter states:

'In the past, we have seen how events in the Middle East are used as an excuse to stir up hatred against communities, including in schools and colleges. It is of the utmost importance that schools and colleges tackle this head on and ensure that where behaviour extends into antisemitism or other discriminatory bullying, it is responded to with all due seriousness'

I am pleased to be able to report that there have been few incidents of concern and where issues have arisen, we have done our best to ensure that they are tackled sensitively and in a timely manner. We will, of course, continue to monitor this situation carefully and continue to stress to all students that we are a diverse and inclusive community. If parents and carers do have any concerns about how this situation is affecting their child they should contact their child's year leader in the first instance.

Reinforced Autoclaved Aerated Concrete (RAAC)

I am finally pleased to be able to inform parents and carers that we have been able to take the decision this week to fully reopen the upper floor of the main building. Movement back into these areas will take place shortly after the half term break.

During what has been a challenging period, the fabric of the school buildings has been fully inspected by an independent surveyor and, more recently, a Department for Education (DfE) appointed surveyor. These surveys

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have provided contrasting results. However, we are now in a position whereby we are fully confident that all areas that were fully inspected do not contain RAAC. There are areas (eg. the school hall roof, second floor roofs, etc.) that contain materials that have some similar characteristics to RAAC but are safe as they do not pose the risk of sudden failure which is the issue associated with RAAC.

There do remain some small areas that have not been fully inspected due to the fact that they remain inaccessible. However, the likelihood of these areas containing RAAC given the fact that it has not been found elsewhere in the school's buildings is extremely low. We will continue to work with a team of surveyors to ensure that these areas are fully inspected shortly after the half term break.

There remains a considerable amount of work to be done to get the school back to its normal functioning. We will be in contact with students and parents shortly after half term to inform them of the exact date that we will revert to the timetable that was in place at the start of the term. At that point in time, all timetables will be updated and shared via the edulink app.

I would again like to thank all parents, carers, staff and students for their patience and resilience throughout this period. Whilst it has been a testing time for all concerned, I have been delighted to see how we have all been able to pull together and support each other as a community.

Behaviour Policy Consultation

Place of Safety Procedures

Your son or daughter may have told you that we have recently practised our 'place of safety' procedures. This is the process by which students and staff put themselves behind a locked door. We are pleased at how well most students responded to the audio message which sounds around the school to commence a 'lockdown'. The vast majority of lessons continued constructively after a brief pause to take a register.

An important part of our procedure, should we need to activate this process for real, is to communicate with you as parents. We have a pre-loaded message ready to go in this situation. To test this part of our procedure, we will be sending out a test message straight after half term. This will be sent to the primary contact for every child in the school. Please keep your eye out for this test message. If you DO NOT receive anything by the end of the first week back, please get in touch with us.

Parents are reminded that, should we need to 'lock' the school down for real, it will be vital that you do not block school phone lines, or physically come to the school. Asking us to release your child during such an event puts you, them and us at risk. We will communicate with you via text message, edulink message and via the school website. To ensure that every parent gets the same information, students will be told to turn mobile phones off.
