

# Headteacher's Update

I would like to thank all parents and carers who took the time to respond to the recent behaviour policy Having read all of the comments consultation. myself, I can state that I was pleased to see the number of thoughtful and constructive responses that were made. Most of the concerns that were raised related to students who were worried or anxious about the prospect of receiving a consequence. With this in mind, I must stress that the consequences element of the policy is designed in such a way as to be preventative and stop repeated behaviours and that we are not seeking to catch students out. It should also be noted that a C1 is a gentle warning to any student that the behaviour should not be repeated and a small number of C1s across an academic year is not looked upon as a concern.

In year group assemblies this week, myself and Ms Ogunlabi talked to the students about the new policy and procedures and stressed these points. Our research suggests that schools who have emerged from the pandemic most effectively have done so with the help of tight and consistent behaviour management systems that are immediate and escalate effectively where students fail to respond. The idea that a student can miss a piece of home learning and end up in a C4 isolation because they failed to attend a previous sanction is aimed at persistent offenders who wilfully ignore school rules rather than actively following school procedures.

It is also important to add that there are some students who come to Vyners who have difficulties with self regulation. Whilst the policy does not discuss this in detail, the reality is that we work incredibly hard to support children's needs regardless of whatever they are. Furthermore, the policy does refer to the need for reasonable adjustments when it comes to some consequences in situations where we know that a child has specific needs that, at times, are difficult to meet.

The new behaviour policy will come into place on Monday 13<sup>th</sup> November and all staff have received training with regard to how to apply the policy in a fair

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and reasonable manner. The final version of the policy can be found here [click here]. As I mentioned to the students this week, a consistent application of this policy will ensure that all students benefit from a calm, productive and safe environment where all children and adults have the opportunity to thrive.

My final request to parents and carers is that they do not challenge C3 detentions. This is happening far too frequently and only has the effect of undermining behaviour at the school. Thank you in advance for your continued support.

### **Parents Evenings**

I received a constructive email from a parent this week about the structure of our parents evenings. which remain online and I thought that it was important to share some of the points of clarification with the wider parent body. Whilst I know that some parents would prefer parents evenings to be face to face, there have been lots of advantages to keeping them as an online activity. One advantage is the timings. As someone who has worked in schools for over 25 years, I can honestly say that appointments at parents' evenings in most secondary schools are 5 minutes in length. This allows for a maximum of 12 appointments in an hour and a whole class of 24-30 students within 3 hours with a short rest break. I am sure that many parents and carers with older children will remember that some parents would continue beyond the 5 minutes, which would then have an impact on other appointments. This is avoided with the current system.

Added to this is the fact that whilst it is common for teachers in core subjects to teach one class in a year group, teachers in the humanities, arts, etc. will often teach multiple classes, which will make it nigh on impossible to see all parents of the children that they teach during the evening and given that the school calendar only allows for one evening per year group in any academic year, we have had to develop a system since our expansion that allows for parents to meet with a range of staff, particularly at key stage 3, but not all staff. Ultimately, the average number of

appointments that were made for the Year 8 parents evening last night was eight, which meant that parents received about 40 minutes of feedback about their child. These evenings are designed to summarise each child's progress and if parents or carers have significant concerns about their child's progress in any given subject they should contact the member of staff in question for a more detailed discussion outside of the consultation evening process.

#### Remembrance

On Monday 13<sup>th</sup> November, we will be observing remembrance as a school community. At around 11am, all staff and students will make their way to the astroturf area to listen to Laurence Binyon's war poem, *For the Fallen,* before the playing of the last post and observing two minutes of silence. Our remembrance ceremony has always been well received by all members of the school community.

I would also like to make families aware that poppies are currently on sale for staff and students at the school.

### **Annual Staff Conference**

A gentle reminder to all families that our annual two day staff conference will be taking place on Thursday 23<sup>rd</sup> and Friday 24<sup>th</sup> November and that the school will be closed to all students on these two days. The theme for these two days will be 'inclusive practice' which will involve all staff from all five trust schools coming together at Ruislip High School on Friday 24th November for the second day of professional learning.
