- Reusable water bottle

Year 8 into 9 Mini Options

Attached is the 'Extended Learning Mini Options' powerpoint from Tuesday evening which contains all the relevant information. The key information to stress is that the students will remain with a broad curriculum where they will **select an additional two option subjects.**

We are still in the process of watching all option videos during tutorial time. The option form is open to be completed but as I emphasised during the evening, it is NOT first come first served, and therefore it is important to take time to think about which option subjects are best for them.

Attendance

As you are aware, attendance is extremely important for your child's success and I would like to highlight that you can keep an eye on your child's attendance percentage on Edulink. The Government defines a child as being "**persistently absent**" from education if their attendance falls to **90%**. Government research shows the link between attendance and attainment is clear:

In 2018/19, just 36% of "persistently absent" children in KS4 got 9 to 4 in their English and maths GCSEs, compared with 84% of regular attenders.

The research also shows that it is never too late to benefit from good attendance: More than half (54%) of pupils who were "persistently absent" in Year 10 and then rarely absent in Year 11, went on to pass at least 5 GCSEs, compared to 36% of pupils who were persistently absent in both years. We know that sometimes it can be difficult to make a decision about attendance if your child is feeling under the weather. If you are unsure, send them in. If it then turns out that they are not well enough to be in school, the school nurse will contact you.
