It was a quite brilliant week with evening performances as well as matinee performances for pupils from local primary schools. The acting, singing and dance routines were immaculate and were supported by a wonderful orchestra made up of current and past Vyners students as well as professional musicians, all under the leadership of Director of Music, Mr Cullum.

The week of performances was the culmination of six months of hard work with at least two rehearsals every week since September. The success of this production was due to a highly collaborative effort between staff and students at the school, but I would particularly like to mention Mrs Moore, Subject Leader for Drama, who produced and directed the production and also undertook all the choreography. This was quite some achievement and it reflects Mrs Moore dedication and commitment to the school community as well as her affinity with the performance arts.





Reflecting on a Theatrical Journey: "Sister Act" at Vyners

As the curtains close on my final production at Vyners, "Sister Act" leaves me with a collection of laughter, good times, and challenges. Transitioning from the role of Wilbur Turnblad in "Hairspray" to Eddie Souther in "Sister Act" marked a significant shift for me, pushing the boundaries of my comfort zone from purely acting to a more diverse singing role. The journey began in September 2023, with auditions that stirred a mix of scepticism and curiosity within me. Balancing my first year of A-levels with rehearsals seemed unnerving, yet the temptation to get involved with another Vyners production proved irresistible. The decision to join was transformative, as rehearsals commenced in October, enveloping me in an atmosphere of dedication and passion.

Under the guidance of Mrs. Moore, who took on the overwhelming task of staging and directing with minimal assistance (as Ms Pope was on maternity leave), the production blossomed. Her unwavering support and coaching were instrumental throughout our preparation. Despite the smooth progression, the technical weekend in late February tested our resolve. The struggle to complete the first act on Saturday the 24th February was palpable, but our collective determination saw us through, ensuring the show's quality. Show week was crescendo of confidence. culminating performances that resonated with the audience and left us with a sense of accomplishment. The students took part in an AQA youth leadership training programme, starting off the morning with a fast-paced game using British Sign Language, where each person was given a sign name and had to remember theirs and everyone else's in the room.

Throughout the morning the HIRB students participated in a number of activities including thinking about the qualities of a leader, examining their own skills and qualities, the importance of being part of a team and identifying issues when planning an activity for other young people. This workshop will lead to the students achieving an AQA qualification.
