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Equalities week

From Monday 19th to Friday 23rd February 2024, schools took part in the fourth Trust-wide equalities week, focusing on celebrating the diverse cultures, backgrounds and identities of the school communities.

At Ruislip High School students took part in a variety of activities and presentations including a workshop on Indonesian Gamelan music (the traditional ensemble music of Indonesia), an experience with Kathak dancing (an Indian classical dance) and a session showcasing cultural cooking. On Wednesday 21st February 2024 all students were encouraged to wear traditional clothing that represented their culture as part of a featured cultural day.

Vyners' community engaged with a number of activities in PSHE, tutorials and assemblies that celebrated their uniqueness. The school also joined Ruislip High's community for the keynote speaker presentation delivered by Jude Guaitamacchi, a leader in transrights campaigning who has made history by chairing the first all-trans panel briefing in UK Parliament with the organisation Trans+ Solidarity Alliance.

Ryefield Primary School's focus was on disability awareness. Students participated in debates and a 'would you rather' activity where students chose between two difficult scenarios and explained their reasoning.

Hermitage Primary School focused on diversity by students sharing their own life stories and celebrating each person's uniqueness, whilst Oak Farm's students explored the importance of living as a rights-respecting citizen. Through discussion, drama and the sharing of experiences students learned how to take actions that respect the rights of others whilst taking into consideration the importance of compassion. The students at Field End Junior School enjoyed exploring their names, backgrounds and family contexts.

Overall, equalities week provided students with an opportunity to work together as a community as well as to celebrate what makes people individuals. It is through developing this understanding that helps to unite our school communities.

Spelling bee

On Wednesday 24th January 2024, Ruislip High School staff were excited to host Vanguard Learning Trust's spelling bee for the second year in a row. The event organisers were also really pleased to welcome staff and students from Oak Farm Primary School, for their first experience of the spelling bee.

The room was filled with anticipatory buzz even before the competition began. Students from all six schools, alongside Ruislip High's Year 7 cohort, filled the seats of the auditorium, all in support of their peers.

Once the competition began, representatives from each school took turns spelling increasingly challenging words one by one, earning points for each correctly spelt word. As the difficulty of each word increased, so did the pressure; the students, however, rose to the challenge. Ruislip High and Field End were neck and neck, but Field End's team held its nerve to take the first round.

The second round was the speed challenge. Words in this round centred on the theme of exploration. Students had a choice of difficulty: easy, medium, or hard words to spell. There were some clear tactics employed by the teams with a number of them choosing the 1-point easy ones to answer as quickly as possible.

The last round, though technically the individual challenge, was a final opportunity to earn a few additional points to change the standings. However, with even more challenging words, the fight for the last speller standing was nail-biting. With just two students left, Mr Gould, the host of the event, commented: 'It's just like a penalty shoot-out!'

Japji from Vyners ended up taking the crown of the Trust's best speller, but her fantastic effort in the final round wasn't quite enough to wrestle the overall lead from Field End, with the latter deservedly claiming the team award.

Overall, it was a great opportunity to showcase the best of all six schools. Well done to all the top spellers across the Trust, and congratulations to Field End's stellar Year 6 team on their phenomenal teamwork; it was a well-deserved win.

Poetry project

This term, a Trust-wide poetry project was launched, with all schools in the Trust taking part. Students from Years 5 to 8 took part in two special workshops hosted at Field End Junior School on Wednesday 21st February 2024 and Tuesday 12th March 2024. Students studied poems by Coelho, Agard, Horne and Gorman; the aim of the sessions was to inspire the students to develop their own interpretation of poetry.

The students engaged with enthusiasm, sharing their points of view and penning personal responses. Writing activities included a note to their future self, writing poems where the words create a specific shape that reflects the content of the poem and creating poems by redacting words from other texts. Their work continued beyond the workshops via a blog providing opportunities for collaboration and a real audience. Students are now busy drafting their competition entries. The announcement of the individual school poets of the year and the first ever Vanguard Learning Trust poet laureate will take place after Easter.

School improvement work

Let's Think

Work with Let's Think has continued this term. Lynda Maple, Let's Think maths tutor, led an online session with staff on Wednesday 6th March 2024. Martina Lecky, Let's Think science tutor, taught a lesson at Ruislip High School on Thursday 7th March 2024 and was observed by Ruislip High staff as well as other science leads across the Trust.

'I enjoyed observing the Let's Think science lesson on the reasoning pattern of classification; it served to highlight students' misconceptions and how teachers cannot make assumptions about students' level of reasoning in relation to different constructs. The use of different examples provided the students with a range of contexts to develop their reasoning such as living things and chemicals and the lesson observation aided my understanding of the Let's Think methodology.'

Peer reviews

Curriculum peer reviews have now taken place at Field End Junior School, Vyners School, and Ryefield Primary School.

Field End held the first of the peer reviews on Wednesday 24th January 2024. External reviewers attended from each of the Trust's primary schools. Their comments were reflective and thought-provoking throughout the review day.

Vyners School held its peer review on Wednesday 28th February 2024. The review teams worked collaboratively in pairs, each consisting of a host reviewer and an external reviewer. The focus was on Key Stage 3 for the selected subjects. Mrs Harvey, Deputy Headteacher at Vyners, commented: 'The

review process facilitates a shift from the intent documentation to the practical implementation of the curriculum and the impact of this on student engagement and progress. Connecting the evidence in this way allows the review team to see the curriculum implementation from a student perspective and showcases the excellent practice that happens every day in our Trust classrooms.'

Ryefield's peer review took place on Wednesday 6th March 2024. The review centred on Ryefield's history and geography curricula. Throughout the day, teachers engaged in discussions with their counterparts; interacted with students; observed lessons; and scrutinised teaching materials and plans. It proved to be an enriching experience, fostering professional dialogue and providing a platform for showcasing the school's strengths.
